6. Assembly Organized by Grade 4B: Inspiring Action for Our Planet


Grade P4B students gathered for an enlightening and impactful

- **Overall Mentorship Workshop** (31st January): The programme will conclude with mentors reflecting on their experiences, creating a mentor pledge and embark on their new journey of meeting their mentees!

Through these workshops, our students are developing leadership skills, fostering emotional resilience, and building a nurturing school environment. We look forward to seeing our mentors and mentees continue to thrive and make meaningful connections.


12. P1B and P1C Classes' Visit the Neon Art Museum

"The Future Starts Here" | Victory Day

When writing the script for our play dedicated to Victory Day at the Modern Education Complex named after Heydar Aliyev, we reflected deeply. For the fourth year, we were telling stories of victory. This time, however, we sought a new perspective—thanks to Mr. Tural's suggestion, we embarked on a journey into the future, imagining the future of Karabakh.

The plot revolves around a conversation between a professor at Karabakh University and his students. Ahmed teacher (played by Mr. Atabey) asks his students (portrayed by Malak Babayeva, Inci Mammadli from 8A, Eldar Hasanov from 9A, and Koroglu Rahimli from 9R1)

about their dreams and goals. They talk about using the education they received at Karabakh University to establish spaceports and medical facilities to cure terminal illnesses in Karabakh. Their dreams come to life on stage through the contemporary choreography brought to life by Ms. Turan.

For me, the pinnacle of the play was the students who aspired to become an artist and a poet, proposing to use "living statue" techniques in the future to honor and introduce our martyrs to the world. When writing the poem and staging the scene, my heart was pounding with excitement. It turned out even better than I had hoped. I could feel how deeply the audience was moved when they encountered the living statues representing our martyrs on stage. Their applause confirmed this impact.



We extend our gratitude to all staff members and coordinators who facilitated this memorable visit and to our students for approaching the occasion with the reverence it deserves.
















9. Training Sessions Held for the Azerbaijani National Satellite Innovation Competition

On December 16, 2024, training sessions officially began in connection with the launch of the Azerbaijani National Satellite Innovation Competition project. This project was organized by Azercosmos, and representatives from IDEIA Space traveled to Azerbaijan to conduct a 5-day training program for facilitator teachers. The training sessions, held from December 16-20, 2024, provided teachers with theoretical and practical knowledge in space technologies.

The primary goal of the training was to equip teachers with in-depth knowledge about the design, construction, and management of PocketQube pico-satellites. Using this knowledge, facilitator teachers taught students the fundamentals of space technologies, satellite construction, management, and programming. Facilitators also learned satellite mechanisms during the project preparation phase and became closely involved in designing space missions.


The training sessions went beyond theoretical knowledge and provided teachers with hands-on experience. This played a crucial role in the students' education, fostering their creative thinking and problem-solving skills. Teachers with advanced knowledge in space technologies applied more effective teaching methods to guide their students.

Representing the school, Aytel Asadova and Sabina Malikzada participated in these training sessions. They utilized the knowledge and experience gained to further enhance the educational process for students.

In the Azerbaijani National Satellite Innovation Competition, the winning teams' most significant task is to complete the design and assembly of the PocketQube pico-satellite. This satellite will be launched into low Earth orbit via the SpaceX Falcon 9 rocket. The winning team members will lead this process and oversee the satellite's launch into space.

At the end of the training, the winning team members will have the chance to apply the knowledge and skills they gained to other satellite projects.



Therefore, it is crucial to review the rules and conditions of each country when making your decision. Choosing a foreign university close to your home country can help reduce travel expenses and save time. Additionally, you should consider costs such as rent, food, transportation, and similar expenses and select a country that aligns with your budget.

2. University Rankings

When studying abroad, one of the most important factors to consider is the ranking of the university you choose and the recognition of its diploma in your home country after graduation. Therefore, it is recommended to research the position of your chosen university in ranking lists compiled by international ranking agencies in advance.

Rankings help identify the university you want to attend and simplify the decision-making process. It is also recommended to check the rankings of universities in your chosen field of study beforehand. University rankings can be reviewed on the following websites below:

3. Tuition Fees

4. Visa Application Process

Young people intending to live and work abroad should familiarize themselves with the information about the migration of the chosen country beforehand. The visa procedure rules of each country are different; therefore, it is recommended to refer to official sources before applying for a visa.

The School Years of National Leader Heydar Aliyev, Leyla Huseynova, Humanities Coordinator

Heydar Aliyev, the national leader of the Azerbaijani people and the founder of the independent Azerbaijani state, is one of the most prominent figures in the nation's history. Certain historical

personalities have the unique ability to shape history itself, and Heydar Aliyev was one such leader whose purposeful actions influenced the course of 20th-century history. Whether during the Soviet era or in the years of independence, Heydar Aliyev dedicated his life to safeguarding the history, language, and traditions of his people against external influences. His life and work stand as a testament to selflessness, and his legacy is embodied in today's independent Azerbaijan. Truly, Heydar Aliyev was a leader devoted to his people and the preservation of national sovereignty—a saviour in every sense.

This article aims to share fascinating moments from the childhood of this remarkable personality and visionary leader, Heydar Aliyev.

What was Heydar Aliyev like as a student, a future world political geniuous, during his school years? What were his interests? Why was he often compared to a general? And what debates did his teachers have about his future?

Heydar Aliyev received his secondary education at School No. 1 in Nakhchivan City. This international school was located in a single-story building with a podium, previously the home of a wealthy family forced to leave due to Bolshevik oppression.

Education at the school was conducted in three languages: Azerbaijani, Russian, and Armenian. Heydar Aliyev studied in the Azerbaijani section but frequently interacted with his peers in the Russian section, eventually becoming fluent in Russian. His avid reading habits played a significant role in his language acquisition and intellectual growth. Initially focused on Azerbaijani literature, he later developed an interest in Russian-language books, enriching the family bookshelves with his collection. Among the works he brought home was Goethe's *Faust*, which captivated him so much that his younger brother also attempted to read it, though he found it too challenging to finish.

One day, Heydar Aliyev attended school wearing his father's railway uniform coat. By then, he was a tall senior student, and the coat suited him perfectly. A classmate remarked, "You look just like a general," and from that day forward, his peers affectionately referred to him as "General."

Teachers and classmates alike recalled Heydar Aliyev as a meticulous student. He was always well-dressed, with crisp suits and spotless, ironed shirts. His calm demeanour made him a natural mediator during disputes among peers, resolving conflicts with wisdom and patience.


Heydar Aliyev excelled in military training classes, where his precision and skill stood out. His instructor, Akim Abbasov, who later achieved fame as a major general in World War II, once told him, "You have a bright future. You will become a general." Heydar Aliyev also loved sports, frequently representing his technical school in city competitions.

In addition to his many talents, he had a passion for drawing. In 1999, during a visit to the Momine Khatun Mausoleum in Nakhchivan—a masterpiece by 12th-century architect Ajami Abubakr—he reminisced about his school days:

"I remember walking around this area during my youth. Back then, I loved to draw and dreamed of becoming an artist. Although I didn't understand architecture at the time, my drawings often featured beautiful landscapes, such as Mount Hacha and other landmarks in Nakhchivan. I made several sketches of the Momine Khatun Mausoleum. Sadly, when I left for Baku, then Leningrad and Moscow, all my books and drawings were scattered and lost. It's a regret I carry. Among those were some excellent watercolour pieces."

Heydar Aliyev's extraordinary intellect, sense of responsibility, and ambition distinguished him from his peers. His early dreams of becoming an artist, architect, or teacher evolved into even greater aspirations. History revealed the monumental achievements awaiting him, as he emerged as a saviour for his people. Today, the Republic of Azerbaijan, established under his leadership, stands as a beacon in the Caucasus and a light to the world.







Colombian Literature and Azerbaijani Youth: First Colombian Literary Forum, Fidan Baylarova, Assistant to the School Principal





Profile: Meet our Pastoral Care Coordinator Mr. Ramiro Londono. Interviewed by Mr. Nelson Urrego

Mr. Ramiro Londoño is a Colombian educator. He joined the MTK staff team as the mathematics department coordinator and pastoral coordinator for Secondary and mathematics teacher in High School.

NU: Hola Mr. Ramiro, thank you very much for accepting our invitation to connect and learn more about you. The MTK Newsletter readers are always curious to learn more about our new staff members. Tell us about your first impressions from our school.

RL: My first impression was on the day of my first application interview, and it was enough to know that this was the place where I wanted to teach. From the moment I entered the school, I was greeted warmly, and the people I interacted with were completely open and kind to me.

Additionally, during my time here, I've experienced an excellent atmosphere created not only by the teachers and staff but also by the students. Above all, the respect I've felt has been fundamental. As an expat teacher, this is essential for me.

NU: What made you fall in love about Azerbaijan and its culture?

RL: When the opportunity to come to Baku appeared in my life, it was a complete surprise. I soon discovered there was a special reason behind it: mutual learning. Experiencing Azerbaijan's rich culture, history, and traditions has allowed me to grow both personally and professionally. The warmth of its people and their deep sense of hospitality made me feel at home, even so far from my own country.

Are there similarities between the Colombian and the Azerbaijani cultures?

RL: Absolutely! Both cultures share a strong emphasis on family values and hospitality. In Colombia, we pride ourselves on making guests feel welcome, just like Azerbaijanis do. Another similarity is the importance of traditions and celebrations, which bring people together and highlight the richness of our respective heritages. These cultural characteristics have made it easier for me to adapt and truly appreciate life here in Azerbaijan.

NU: Let us know a little bit more about your journey in education. How did you become a teacher?

RL: I'll try to summarize it. While studying engineering, I had my first experience with teaching at the age of 16 when I became a tutor in Mathematics and Physics at the university. I supported both first-year and final-year students, and that's when I realized how much I enjoyed teaching.

Even though I worked as an engineer, I continued teaching as a parallel job. At the right moment, I decided to fully dedicate myself to education. Before coming to Baku, I was working as a university calculus teacher and the Head of the Mathematics Department at an international school in Bogotá, Colombia.

So, I chose to become a teacher because, for me, teaching is not just about providing academic support—it's about training students with the tools they need to succeed in life and society.

NU: Thank you. How is teaching in Colombia different than teaching in Azerbaijan? Do both countries have similar challenges in education?


RL: Teaching in Colombia and Azerbaijan offers unique experiences related to cultural, social, and educational contexts. In Colombia, classrooms often show highly dynamic and interactive environment, where students are encouraged to voice their opinions and participate actively. The Colombian system places a strong emphasis on creativity and adaptability due to the diverse socio-economic backgrounds of students. In Azerbaijan, there is a noticeable emphasis on discipline, tradition, and respect within the classroom, which creates a structured learning environment. The relationship between students and teachers tends to be more formal, and the educational framework strongly values academic rigor and achievement. In Colombia our educational system is designed for the students to learn working on projects and in Azerbaijan, students are studying and being trained to present standardized tests and aim to their professional development, different styles in teaching.

Do both countries have similar challenges in education?

Yes, both countries face some comparable challenges, such as: **Bridging Educational Gaps**, **Globalization in education**, **Engaging Students**, **Teacher Training and Development**. But you

know, when I'm in the classroom I just feel like there's no difference in kids, kids are kids in every part of this world.





NU: As a Mathematics teacher and coordinator, what are your impressions about the level of mathematics in School?

RL: First, I want to express my gratitude for the opportunity to be part of the mathematics team and contribute to helping students improve every day in this subject.

My impressions of the level of mathematics at the school are very positive. The school has a strong foundation in logical problem-solving and mathematical procedures. Additionally, students achieve good results in standardized tests and, most importantly, they enjoy mathematics—a significant advantage for fostering long-term engagement with the subject.

In terms of areas for improvement, as a team, we recognize the need to further enhance the results of standardized tests to raise the overall average. It's also essential to strengthen students' reading and comprehension skills, particularly when tackling word problems. This will ensure that they are prepared to apply mathematics as a practical tool for solving real-world problems.

As the Mathematics Coordinator, I can confidently say that we have a solid foundation and great potential to work with, and I am excited to see how we can continue to grow and excel together as a team.

NU: In your role as our pastoral coordinator, what strengths have you noticed in our students' attitudes and what challenges we have ahead?

RL: As Pastoral Coordinator, I've observed many positive attributes in our students' attitudes. One of the greatest strengths is their sense of community and willingness to support one another in addition to respect differences. However, challenges remain as we strive to nurture a more disciplined and self-reflective mindset among students. Some areas for growth include helping students manage conflicts constructively and ensuring consistency in following school rules and expectations. Another challenge is supporting students to develop greater resilience and responsibility, particularly in facing academic and personal challenges.

Moving forward, fostering a balance between freedom and accountability will be key. By continuing to emphasize values such as the *Three Rs*—Response, Reflect, and Reparation—we can guide students toward becoming self-aware, respectful, and socially responsible individuals.

NU: What improvements have you noticed in our secondary students' conduct recently?

RL: This fall, from September to November, we have witnessed remarkable progress in student behavior, highlighted by a **36% average reduction in detentions**. This improvement is a testament to our community's commitment to understanding and applying the school's principles of responsibility, reflection, and growth. Also, students have realized the importance of being on time for classes and the high respect for the school.

NU: Why is it important to promote core values like respect in the recent generations?

How to cultivate respect? (maybe talk about the role of parents too)

RL: Promoting core values like respect in recent generations is crucial for building harmonious and productive societies. In today's globalized world, young people encounter diverse cultures, opinions, and perspectives daily. Respect forms the foundation for understanding and collaboration, enabling them to thrive in such a globalized environment. It fosters empathy, reduces conflicts, and cultivates meaningful relationships, all of which are essential for personal and professional success. In addition, I gotta say that family is a core help in the values learning process because, it is the first example that a person has and a good reinforcement of the education receive at school, coherence is the key process.

NU: Apart from family, what do you miss the most from your home country, and how do you cope with homesickness?

RL: As you said, I miss my family but I really miss my Colombian food, even, food from here is delicious, there are some product you don't have here, so that's what I miss the most and to cope with homesickness, first I got a cat, his name is Kal-el, and he is one (1) year and half already, so he is my company and I'm lucky that here in Baku there are Latinos, so we have a group and when we meet we try to do some things without Latino Flow

NU: Our Latin American DNA is colorful and passionate about football, music and dance (among other areas), any plans or suggestions to promote a better understanding of this culture in our school? A salsa club, hahaha?

RL: A salsa club or merengue club would be the best idea, hehehe, or a movie club. I think that maybe here at school we could have a day on which we could show something from each person's culture, like music, food or dance. On Wednesdays I have a Spanish club with some primary students and it feels so good to listen to them learning words and sentences in Spanish.

NU: Mr. Ramiro, thank you very much for your time. It has been a pleasure having this chat with you.

RL: thank you for the invitation and most of all, for the opportunity of being part of this institution where I have found beautiful people and environment.


















COP29 with the view of volunteers, Akif Mammadyarov 9r1 grade student


Recognizing symptoms

One of the major signs of stress is the constant feeling of worry. The pressure of preparing for multiple subjects as well as having to keep up with the deadlines can lead to ongoing concern. This can become overwhelming, making it difficult to handle. Another symptom is difficulty sleeping. Students find themselves staying up late to study, depriving themselves of sleep, which reduces their performance and productivity. Furthermore, overthinking exam can lead to physical indicators of stress, like headaches, which makes it challenging to stay focused and prepare for the tests.

How to manage the stress

After identifying the symptoms, it is crucial to get a handle on them. Reaching out for help can make a world of difference. Counselors can provide strategies like relaxation techniques and mindfulness meditation to help students approach exams more calmly. Furthermore, prioritizing self-care is vital. Getting enough sleep and engaging in physical activity can improve overall mood. Aim for 7-8 hours of sleep per night and avoid screens at least an hour before sleep. Finally, preparing a balanced study schedule, consisting of breaks can boost productiveness and lighten the load of a heavy workload. One of the most prominent study methods is Pomodoro Technique. It involves studying in focused 25-minute intervals, followed by a 5-minute break. After 4 sessions, a longer break of 15-30 minute is recommended. Another tactic is the Feynman Technique, named after physicist Richard Feynman, is a way of learning by teaching. Try explaining a topic in simple terms out loud as if teaching it to someone who is unfamiliar with the subject. This can solidify your knowledge and understanding.

In conclusion, while exam stress is natural and inevitable part of academic life, identifying the symptoms and choosing an effective strategy to manage can ease the exam preparation without sacrificing mental wellbeing.
