2. World Mental Health Day



6. Meeting John Boyne at the 10th Baku International Book Fair


















Our Students Shine Again at the SAF Festival, by Alasgar Asadov, STEAM and ICT Coordinator





On a recent educational excursion of 6i3 students had the opportunity to explore the rich cultural heritage of Azerbaijan through a visit focused on the life and contributions of Uzeyir Hajibeyov, a prominent composer and the author of the Azerbaijani national anthem. Known as the "father of Azerbaijani classical music," Hajibeyov's legacy is deeply intertwined with the cultural landscape of Shusha, a city renowned for its historical significance and artistic heritage.

Uzeyir Hajibeyov was born in 1885 in Shusha, which is often regarded as the cradle of Azerbaijani culture. Profile: Meet our Secondary Science Coordinator Ms. Simone Blake. Interviewed by Mr. Nelson Urrego

NU: Ms. Simone, good day. How are you? And thank you for accepting this invitation to connect and allow our MTK Newsletter readers to know more about you.

SB: Good day- buenos días para usted señor! It's an absolute pleasure to accept this invitation.

NU: Hahaha, buenos días Ms. Simone, let me start by expressing my gratitude for the positive transformation you have led in the Science department. What made you fall in love with Science and how was your journey to become a successful and inspiring science teacher (and leader)?



SB: I first was introduced to a form of science in my home before learning in school. Growing up I lived with my grandparents and many times I had the responsibility to care for them. My grandmother was unfortunately rather sickly and so I learned from a very young age to administer bandages, helping with medication and it's from there the practical application of science helped me to develop an interest in the sciences from a very young age. Biochemistry is my soft spot. I love learning about nutrition and how that impacts the body, Chemistry with all the different reactions and elements which make up the body and hormones however science is so broad. By working hard in all subjects, you can gain access to experience the wide scope of science. I think one of the most interesting and exciting experiences for me in my academic lifespan was studying Forensic science for a time at university! Like beauty, success is in the eyes of the beholder. I believe I am still working towards being successful and that is because I try not to be complacent in learning something new or in refining my skills. At the start of my teaching career, I saw a documentary about underprivileged children wanting to learn but the families didn't have money to pay for fees, books or had to walk miles because of deprivation or poverty. I made a vow to myself that as long as I have life in me and as well as access, I will not take opportunities for granted. This is why I pursued my Masters qualification and additional skills that have come along the way and sharing that information with others also esteems the people I work with. Everyone therefore gets the opportunity to grow with me as a team.

NU: Thank you for sharing Ms. Simone, how inspiring story and how interesting your journey has been to become a science enthusiast and teacher. Is MTK your first international experience? What challenges have you found as an international teacher and how have you approached them?

SB: This is my first international experience and it has been a wonderful dream. Back home I was never one to venture far away from family or go to the big city like London to work and so being able to share this experience with my family has helped to overcome some of the anxieties that would normally come with moving and working abroad. I am *extremely thankful* for having a supportive husband who counsels me in important decision-making concerning our family. As a woman, in a foreign place with a young family, without that support network I can imagine it can be a challenge for some. However, in my experience, coming to a place like Azerbaijan, the people are so welcoming and friendly in comparison with some of the places I have lived back in the UK. I genuinely call MTK my "extended family". The expectation here is based on my skills rather than preconceived ideas of my (cultural) background. I am treated no differently, I am encouraged and motivated by my colleagues, SLT and my team. The environment that MTK has created for me and what we aspire to have really makes it easier to settle (for me) and grow as a professional and that is something that I am truly grateful for.







NU: I remember your kindness and welcoming vibe when we met in March, but what really surprised me was how well you got involved with the local community and how advanced you were in the use of the Azerbaijani language. What do you think makes the Azerbaijani culture so unique and what aspects of the school you appreciate more?

SB: Hahaha that is so kind to say. I truly think the heart of an international school is the people that it represents. People come from all walks of life and the workplace is one of those places where different energies can connect. The last thing is being in a place where you are not

wanted and not appreciated and on a scientific level, this transcends to your mood and overall wellbeing. Many people have the perception that going to the Western countries you have many more opportunities but in actual fact, I have come here and have seen/experienced so many opportunities. I haven't explored the culture outside of Baku City!! Local staff and expat teachers who have travelled around have told me plenty of positive things about Azerbaijan, the food and the family spirit and so if the culture is anything like what I have experienced so far, it is my mission for this year to travel wider and learn more!

NU: Ms. Simone, you have supported and championed interesting projects: the science fair, the compost initiative, etc. what further endeavours are in the horizon for the science department?

SB: The MTK Science department is evolving. We are in the development stages of creating a dimension of education that provides learners with both the knowledge and hands-on experience to cope with the demands of the real world. Already our wonderful team have put on the initiative to offer a science club for Primary learners to capture their attention from early and both myself and Ms Gulaya who is the Primary Science Coordinator have made it one of our goals to bridge the gap between primary and secondary. Through this, we have had primary teachers being supported by and pupils gaining first-hand experience of practical experiments and being taught in the laboratories by a science specialist. How many schools in Azerbaijan can say that happens in their school with confidence? With the strategic steps the school is making working towards CIS Accreditation status, we are seizing this opportunity to explore different pedagogical practices like project-based learning, that will encourage learners to use a wide range of skills learnt across all disciplines to communicate and get a larger awareness of the world around them. Looking at the Sustainable Goals and how science impacts achieving those goals, really tells how important the sciences are and how science needs to be accessible to all learners, because the knowledge learnt here truly impacts the way people live, in some shape or form.



NU: Ms. Simone not only are you an inspiring teacher, but also you are a talented singer. Is this a hobby, or a potential loss for science in favour of an artistic dream J?

SB: Hahaha oh geez! When I was younger, at one point I wanted to be a singer. I give credit to my mother who was my first music teacher. From young I realised that it is a very competitive field and that there is no harm in entertaining a hobby that generates some sort of revenue. But I also studied AS Level Drama and Theatre studies, and I graduated in my first degree with Honours in Media & Communications where my dissertation was a 2-hour radio show! It truly helps to have a wide skillset where you can reach everyone at different levels. Being multifaceted helps you to be versatile in such a fast-paced, dynamic world. Working in retail and several years in accounts bridged the gap in life-skills where access at a time was limited. Having the chance in life to explore, make mistakes and learn from them helped me to grow as a person and do something that I like so... IF science should ever fail me in the future, look out for me on the TV!
